## About this course

This programme addresses the growing demand for qualified professionals who can harness the opportunities presented by rapid urban development, whilst safeguarding heritage assets and preserving the individual identities of expanding cities.

## Introduction

The fastest growing cities are in the Global South. Both tangible and intangible heritage assets are at risk in cities globally, as they're often the first casualties of urban transformation projects, particularly in coastal cities where land values are high. Consequently, there's an urgent need for academic and technical expertise to address the issues associated with urban development and heritage management in a more integrated manner, benefitting both society and planet.

This multi-disciplinary programme integrates architecture, urban planning, urban policy and practice, history, sustainability and social sciences, and considers the impact of globalisation and the climate crisis. You'll explore the fundamentals of global urbanisation and heritage, and

examine patterns of heritage development, conservation, policy and practice. Through a combination of theoretical knowledge and practical skills, you'll come to understand the role, influence and impact of historic and contemporary heritage (and heritage at risk) on urban trajectories.

Heritage is a core research pillar of the University of Liverpool, and the Liverpool School of Architecture is at the forefront of research in architecture, planning and heritage. The International Urbanism and Coastal Heritage Lab (UCH Lab), Architecture Heritage and Urbanism of West Africa Research Centre, The Heritage Institute and other research centres affiliated to the School contribute to this research field in UK, European contexts and further afield. Collectively, their contributions have produced documents and designs, technological and policy initiatives.

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## What you'll learn

- Knowledge of the concepts, theories, and principles guiding urbanisation, sustainable development and urban governance
- Understanding of the historical, cultural and socio-political factors that influence urban development and transformation
- Insight into the complexities of cultural heritage in an increasingly globalised world, including challenges in heritage preservation and conservation
- Understanding of the relationship between heritage and sustainability issues
- Research and writing skills that will enable you to undertake an independent project (i.e. dissertation or design thesis)
- Presentation, teamwork and time management skills.

## Teaching and assessment

### How you'll learn

Teaching takes place primarily on campus and occasionally online, via Teams or other software platforms. The online teaching will be primarily undertaken as part of our collaboration with the University of Lagos, which will entail staff involvement from the Institute of African and Diaspora Studies at the University of Lagos contributing as guest lecturers. It'll be further enriched through the contributions of other invited guest lecturers and stakeholders from industry, institutions and relevant organisations.

Lectures will be supplemented by tutorials and seminars (taking place on a weekly basis), workshops and studio work. Students are required to continuously engage in group work, and there will be opportunities for fieldwork.

### How you're assessed

The assessment strategy is focused on authentic assessment, designed to help you develop creative problem-solving skills, teamwork skills and advanced research skills.

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# Fees and funding

## Tuition fees

### UK fees (applies to Channel Islands, Isle of Man and Republic of Ireland)

### International fees

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## Postgraduate entry requirements

We require a 2:2 (or equivalent from an overseas institution) in Urban and Regional Planning, Architecture, Urban Studies, Area Studies, Demography and Population studies, Development Studies, Sociology, History, Geography, Archaeology or another closely related discipline.

A minimum of one year's work experience in a relevant field is desirable, but not essential.

**All candidates are required to submit a CV and a personal statement highlighting experience and motivation in applying for the programme.** Applicants with non-traditional qualifications, but requisite experience, may be invited to interview.
