
You are helping us to create global change by funding research.


It's thanks to your incredible support that we were able to raise £3 million to give the city this much-needed new venue, showcasing the best established and emerging musical talent from around the world.

# A NATURAL PARTNERSHIP

A 64 acre jewel in rural Cheshire, Ness Botanic Gardens is the green and flourishing heart of the University of Liverpool estate.

This year, the gardens celebrate their 125th anniversary. Their continued growth is thanks to donors like you who have supported this beautiful spot on the banks of the River Dee since its foundation.

Ness' founder Arthur Bulley, was one of the 20th century's greatest plant collectors and sponsors – commissioning botanists from around the globe to bring specimens back to his nurseries. Quite simply, with his passion – and vision – Bulley transformed British gardening.

After his death in 1942, his daughter, Agnes Lois Bulley, gifted her father's cherished gardens to the University of Liverpool and, ultimately, to the people of the city. It was an incredible act of faith and generosity. And it was one we were more than thrilled to accept.



Agnes Lois wished to ensure the gardens remained a cherished space for the public to enjoy, just as her father envisaged. It's an agreement we are proud to honour to this day.

For over 100 years, Ness has been cared for by its staff, volunteers, and supporters. Together we are committed to conservation with sustainability at its core. We are developing research and education programmes, and encouraging our communities to enjoy our wonderful green space.

This year also marks 75 years since we became custodian of what was affectionately known as 'Bulley's Garden'.

To mark the occasion, celebrations will include guided walks and an Anniversary Flower show.

#### HEAD AND NECK CANCER RESEARCH - A DECADE OF PROGRESS

How your funding translates to front line care, and groundbreaking developments in cancer research.

Ten years ago, thanks to a generous donation from The Johnson Foundation, the University of Liverpool was able to fund a new initiative in cancer research, equipping a new laboratory for translational research and tissue banking in head and neck oncology at Aintree University Hospital, now part of Liverpool University Hospitals NHS Trust.

The Liverpool Head and Neck Centre was launched with local NHS partners in 2018 and the Centre is the largest collaboration in the UK for research and treatment of patients with disease of

the head and neck.
There are currently 19 major
trials being run from the Centre,
involving more than 1,650
patients. Centre researchers
have secured £30m in research
grants, published 600 peer-

reviewed papers, and were first in the UK to trial a head and neck cancer vaccine in 2022.

Professor Richard Shaw, Professor of Head & Neck Surgery, said, "This donation allowed us to deliver clinical trials and laboratory research, fundamentally improving the outcomes not only for cancer patients in Liverpool but also influencing care further afield. In particular the funding was an important step to the formation of Liverpool Head & Neck Centre in 2018."

"The funding provided by The Johnson Foundation has underpinned many of the successes we have gone on to achieve since. We will remain eternally grateful to the Foundation for providing such an important springboard," said Professor Terry Jones, Director of Liverpool Head and Neck Centre.



It was a personal connection to someone with this devastating disease that introduced us to Aintree and the University's pioneering work back in 2013, and it is amazing to see the wider impact of a gift a decade on. It is very heartening to know that we have been able to support this expansion of research to help people with Head and Neck Cancer, which is such a major healthcare problem in the Liverpool City Region and beyond."

### PREPARING THE WORLD:

#### THE PANDEMIC INSTITUTE



Since the launch of The Pandemic Institute two years ago, which was founded following a transformative donation by Innova Medical Group, the Institute has focused on providing capability across three areas of connected work fundamental to controlling emerging threats. The Institute, which draws on a unique partnership between Liverpool's universities, NHS trusts and local government, is seeking to create a step-change in how the world prepares for, responds to, and recovers from pandemic threats, building on decades of research on emerging infections, as well as the city's pioneering work during COVID-19.

#### **TO PREPARE:**

The Pandemic Institute is identifying pathogens of pandemic potential before they spill-over to humans, which will help countries build their capacity for future threats. Lord Leverhulme's Charitable Trust is supporting two PhD studentships at The Pandemic Institute. Trustee Anthony Hannay said: "This is a really important area of research which may yet be critical to the future of humanity, and we are very pleased to be able to support outstanding institutions in delivering this work."

#### TO RESPOND:

The Pandemic Institute will be investing in facilities and research to accelerate the development of diagnostics, medicines and vaccines. Part of the founding donation has been matched by Research England to set up a 12-bed isolation in-patient human challenge facility at the Liverpool School of Tropical Medicine in their Accelerator Building. This is a faster, more cost-effective way of assessing the efficacy and safety of new vaccines and therapeutics.

#### TO RECOVER:

In support of The Pandemic Institute's work to improve understanding of how we recover from, and build resilience to, future threats, leading UK insurer Aviva has donated £225k to support eight research projects to assess the longerterm impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on UK and global health. Projects include forecasting models for COVID-19 bed occupancy and admissions for individual
