Wi-Fi for visitors

If you are visiting the University you can connect to Wi-Fi on campus via the following options:

Option 1) If you are a visitor from another academic institution:



If you are visiting from an institution that participates in the eduroam scheme, you can login to the secure eduroam Wi-Fi service using your usual username and password.

Option 2) If you want to access Public Wi-Fi



If you are not a visitor from another academic institution, you can use the WiFi Guest service powered by Sky WiFi (The Cloud). It's just like when you use this service in other public places or hotels - simply register your details to get connected.
