Treasurer's Report: Howard Hunt

In my first year as treasurer for Interchange, we have seen very little movement in the accounts other than the replenishment of petty cash for ongoing expenses from our current account. This has resulted in a small (under £200) negative cash flow on this account. The deposit account was untouched and, therefore, gained a small amount of interest. Overall, our assets have decreased by approximately 2.5% in 2015. This is in line with previous years' movements.

During the year we received a grant to hold a 21st Birthday celebration. This was managed outside our normal accounting system.

From 2016 onwards, it may be advantageous for us to include salaries and facilities payments from the University in the annual accounts. At the moment, this would have a neutral impact on the accounts but in future we may need to show these figures in the accounts. This will particularly apply if we have separate income streams from outside the University.

For 2015, we appointed a new independent examiner, Mr John Hannah, from Elmwood Accounting. It is proposed that we continue with this arrangement for 2016.

Staff Report: Claudette Graham

2015 was another busy year for Interchange. We continued to provide support to our 22 2014/15 students. We held several briefing sessions for the Voluntary and Community Organisations (VCOs) which resulted in 44 project ideas for 2015/16. We also welcomed new partnership with several new VCOs and continued to work successfully with current partners. There was continued high attendance at the drop in sessions in the Interchange office as the flexibility of drop in times was favourable.

Our 22 students graduated in July 2015 we welcomed 21 new students in September 2015.

We celebrated 21 years of Interchange with a wonderful event held at Blackburne House which captured Interchange generously over the past, present and future. As we approach the end of 2015 our cohort of students settled in with their projects and Link Workers.
