



Hello and welcome to the LDC Development Programme theme of 'Careers'



So firstly, why should you be involved in career preparation from the start of your PhD?

Some PhD researchers prefer not to think about their career until the end of their PhD, even leaving this until the completion of their Thesis.


Certainly, your PhD is likely to be one of the essential items in your final CV. However you are likely to be competing against others who also have a PhD - how will you distinguish yourself in applications?



You may not need to make key career decisions in your first year, but you can begin developing useful skills. Consider what is expected in a highly competent PhD researcher. Can you find ways to acquire relevant skills and experience to enhance your future career options?

Your accomplishments may feel small at the start of our PhD, but your experience will build in later years.

Later on in the degree, you can review your skills, start to recognise your work preferences and research potential careers, to help you get ready for the actual application process.


Other areas of the University may offer more specific career advice
