


Hello and welcome to this introduction to the LDC Development Programme theme covering Presentation skills



Giving presentations is part of research life, through the need to communicate your research to the wider academic world, coherently and with confidence Good presentation skills can help establish you as a competent and interesting researcher, and promote your career., inside or outside of academia



The Researcher Development Framework covers communication and publication under subdomain D2, Communication and Dissemination and also under subdomain D3 Engagement and Impact . This can include both spoken and poster presentations, and with audiences varying from research focussed to the general public.

You will also use skills such as argument construction and Innovation to produce convincing presentations that impress your audience. You will also need to communicate your research through networking, which also offers practice in simplifying and explaining your central research concepts.



So how can you develop these skills?

Obviously practice is essential.

Ideally departmental or research groups talks is a chance to present to those who know your area

Conferences can be more challenging but also motivating

If you lack these opportunities, you could consider sessions outside your department, interdisciplinary forums or public engagement, which give good practice in delivering an engaging presentation and add to your CV




