





# Research Staff Association Buddy Scheme – 5<sup>th</sup> Round May 2025



## **Introduction**

Following the successful rounds of the Research Staff Association's (RSA) Buddy Scheme in Spring 2022, Autumn 2022, Spring 2023, and Spring 2024, the RSA launched the fifth round in Spring 2025. The Buddy Scheme is designed for research-only contract staff - such as postdoctoral researchers and early career researchers (ECRs) - and provides a valuable opportunity to meet new colleagues, expand networks, and engage more fully with the University of Liverpool's research culture in an informal setting. It brings together peers at similar career stages across all faculties, fostering connections beyond individual research groups and enriching participants' professional, academic, and social perspectives.

## The Process


The fifth round of the Buddy Scheme followed the same process as the fourth round. It was promoted through the RSA's weekly e-bulletins and the University of Liverpool RSA's account on X (@Uol RSA). Appendix 1 shows the promotional materials published on the University of Liverpool RSA's X account, that reached 437 views (@Uol RSA, Appendix, Figure 1). Additional information on the Buddy Scheme was available on the RSA webpages, where research-only contract staff could access and complete a short expression of interest form. The form requested basic details including name, department, email address and reason(s) for participating in the Scheme.

The overall timeline of the Round 5 of the Buddy Scheme is shown in Figure 1. The expression of interest form was open from 3<sup>rd</sup> February to 21<sup>st</sup> February 2025. Thirty research-only contract staff (postdoctoral researchers or ECRs) signed up for this round of the Buddy Scheme (a 20% increase compared to the last round). Applicants were matched based on their interests and grouped into teams of three or four, resulting in seven groups of three and two groups of four.

All participants were emailed the names and contact emails of their buddies on 28<sup>th</sup> February and asked to arrange a meeting – either in person or online - by 21<sup>st</sup> March 2025. General meeting guidelines were provided, encouraging participants to respect the meeting preferences of others in their group and keeping the tone of the meetings respectful, informal, and supportive.




A reminder email was sent to the buddy groups on 10<sup>th</sup> March prompting the participants to arrange their meeting by 21<sup>st</sup> March 2025. After a 3-week meeting window closed, a feedback survey was distributed on 24<sup>th</sup> March, with a reminder sent on 7<sup>th</sup> April. Participants were invited to provide feedback and share their experiences by 11<sup>th</sup> April 2025.

# **The Participants**

Figure 2 shows the distribution of Buddy Scheme participants across three faculties at the University of Liverpool. Of 30 participants, the majority were from the Faculty of Health and Life Sciences (19 participants), followed by the Faculty of Science and Engineering (9 participants), and the Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences (2 participants).

Participants cited a range of motivations for joining the Buddy Scheme, with the most common being the opportunity to meet researchers from similar or different backgrounds and to exchange tips and experiences related to career development. Some participants also expressed an interest in meeting other research staff to explore potential research collaborations (Appendix, Table 1).

### Selected responses to the question: What would you like to get out of the Scheme?

"Learn about very different areas of academia beyond my own network within natural sciences. Learn about academic practices in other disciplines"


"I have been at the University since July 2024 and would like to meet others doing either similar work in different areas, or people who are at a similar stage in their career. I have a long research career but am only just coming to the end of my PhD (outside the University of Liverpool) and am working on fixed term research contracts."

"I want to meet new people. I am currently engaging in the Prosper cohort and would like to understand different approaches to improve my prospects."

## **Evaluation**

At the end of the Scheme, participants were invited to complete a short online evaluation survey. The initial invitation for feedback was sent on 24<sup>th</sup> March 2025 followed by a reminder on 7<sup>th</sup> April requesting feedback by 11<sup>th</sup> April. Ten participants (a third of the cohort) completed the survey by the deadline. All respondents reported meeting with their buddies during the 3-week window. These meetings took place in person (over coffee or lunch, 8 responses) or online (*via* MS Teams, 2 responses). Of those who met, 90% rated the experience as positive, selecting either 'good' or 'very good' (Figure 3 and Appendix, Table 2).

Participants highlighted the opportunity to connect with colleagues from across the University who were at similar career stages. Respondents saw it as a useful opportunity to hear about other people's career journeys and reported feeling less isolated and more confident about navigating the new challenges as a result of their participation in the Buddy Scheme (Appendix, Table 3).

# Selected responses to the question: What was the highlight of the buddy Scheme for you?

"A highlight of the buddy scheme for me was the opportunity to connect with someone in a supportive and welcoming environment. It was great to share experiences, exchange advice, and build confidence while navigating new challenges together."

"As few members of the group have completed their education in different parts of the world, it was interesting to understand their experience with university life specifically with regards to research in different countries. It was also interesting to learn about their current research projects."

"Meeting fellow researchers from other disciplines and getting to know about their interesting research"




Respondents expressed interest in learning about how the matching happens, recommended broader promotion of the Scheme and suggested extending the meeting window. They also proposed introducing meeting themes to help guide the discussions.

## **Conclusions**

The fifth round of the RSA Buddy Scheme offered a valuable opportunity for research staff at the University of Liverpool to establish new connections and expand their professional networks. The sixth round of the Buddy Scheme is scheduled to take place in March 2026. In addition, the third round of the joint scheme between the RSA and University's PGR Development Network is planned for Autumn 2025 aiming to cultivate a more integrated and collaborative researcher community.

meet people from different departments/faculties

I'd be interested in collaborating with anybody whose research involves statistical methods to analyse trends in populations (such as public health, psychology or social sciences), or anybody with a clinical background (especially if their work involved neuroscience or vaccines/infectious disease, two health areas I have experience in). This



is a minor preference, though, as I would also be very interested to learn about a completely different discipline if the other person wanted the same thing.

I joined the scheme last year and organised a group meeting with new PDRAs at the University. I am a part of the organising committee for this year's round and I would like to meet new PDRAs.

I will be submitting my PhD at the end of this month so I'm very early in my research career. I'm currently on a 0.5 contract within the Department of Primary Care and Mental Health, working on a series of systematic reviews. My research interests are wide - I previously studied history and global health. I'm happy to meet with anyone working in any field. I'm interested in hearing about others' research. I'd like to learn about any issues that can be encountered when starting an academic career, things I should be aware of or look out for, maybe to do with contracts, networking, and identifying opportunities for employment and collaboration.

Meet and share experiences with other members of the University, discuss similarity and differences in the daily challenges and how to solve issues and improve the workflow.

- 2) Potential future collaborators, from health-related research area.

I would like to meet people from different institutes or faculties, preferably those conducting qualitative or mixed methods research.

I would like to connect with researchers interested in epidemiology and data science, as my current department is not directly aligned with my research focus or background. Coming from a dental background, I am interested in engaging with other researchers working in public health, health data science, and related fields.

Meet other research fellows from different research areas and departments, to network and learn about different experiences of engaging with the university etc.

I would like to meet researchers especially in electrical engineering and physics departments, working on electronic devices.
