


Gender



There is a fairly even split amongst respondents in the two largest gender sets. With males making up 49.39% and Females 46.06%.

Age



Key Fact:

Over a third of respondents are under 35 years old (37.58%), indicating a younger workforce vs the standard in the Sector. Atypically this means skills are less likely to be lost but it may be an indicator that the workforce require more support in their development and career progression.

Ethnicity





Key Fact:

Over 87% of respondents are ethnically 'White'. This is not only higher than the HE Technical sector, it is also above the demographic of Liverpool as a city.

Insight point:

There is a lot of 'bunching' around Grade 5 and Grade 6. This could indicate that progression past these points is not regularly achieved and reinforce that there may be a 'glass ceiling' to grades 7 and 8.
