

The Interchange Portfolio (module SOCI303) Short Interchange Project (module SOCI311)

Interchange is a registered charity (No. 1038129) based in the Department of Sociology, Social Policy and Criminology at the University of Liverpool's School of Law and Social Justice, which mediates between students and local voluntary and community organisations (VCOs).

We offer 3rd year students an alternative to a dissertation, in the form of a research project in collaboration with one of our partner VCOs. This includes:

- Evaluation reports
- Feasibility studies
- Social policy reviews
- Community development activities
- Documentary and oral histories
- Identification and exploration of knowledge gaps

VCOs will meet your basic travel expenses and pay for a Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) check, if required.

SOCI303: The Interchange Portfolio | 30 credits, Sep-May

SOCI303 gives students the opportunity to engage in a social research project or work-based learning project in collaboration with a VCO, via primary research.

In this full-year module, students actively participate in 'shared conversations' in both the university-based workshops that support the module, and in active collaborations with their VCO. A participatory/collaborative approach is encouraged to engage in a way that involves a process of action and reflection.

Students will be expected to think about the practical problems that this sector is trying to solve and to effect change that will empower individuals and communities. Essential to this is the principle that students are not working *for* the VCO but *with* the VCO.

Towards the end of the academic year, students will produce for their VCO a 6000-word report including the background of the organisation, an analysis of findings from the research, and recommendations to take forward.

Projects may also include the production of promotional material, websites, directories or handbooks.

SOCI311: Short Interchange Project | 15 credits, Sep-Jan

SOCI311 gives students the opportunity to examine legislation, social policy, or a gap in knowledge pertinent to a VCO, via desk research.

Towards the end of semester one, students will produce for their VCO a 4000-word report including an overview of the organisation, a review of a specific social policy/piece of legislation/knowledge gap, the impact of the issue, analysis of how it fits in to the organisation, and recommendations to take forward.
