# GETTING

# DIGITAL STATUS

## How do I prove my status?

- All international students issued with an evisa also known as digital status
- Told how to access this in your decision letter
- You will need to obtain a share code online to give to the University so they can access your immigration status
- Your evisa will show your expiry date (4 months after your course end date)

## Important Notes:

- You must only enter the UK AFTER your Student Route visa permission is issued
- If you enter(ed) before this date then you will be here in the UK as a visitor not as a student and so you MUST leave the UK and re-enter using your Student Route visa after it is issued
- You will not be able to register for your course until you have attended **International Registration...**

# ATTENDING

## INTERNATIONAL REGISTRATION

### What is International Registration?

- For all international students to provide evidence of their right to study
- Everyone who holds a Student Route or other UK visa **MUST** book a place to attend
- You can also collect your Student ID card (if you have already uploaded a photo)

### When and where is it held?

- Running in the **Careers Studio**, Ground Floor of Foundation Building, University Square
- **Monday, 26<sup>th</sup> January 2026 to Friday, 6<sup>th</sup> February 2026**

### How do I book a place to attend?

- Follow the instructions in the email you have received with a link to book a time slot to attend

### What should I bring?

- Original passport, share code, proof of arriving in the UK (e.g. flight ticket or boarding pass)

# STUDENT GUIDE

# FOR UK VISA HOLDERS

### Work placements

Student visa holders undertaking work placements as an integral part of their programme, whether based inside or outside the UK, are allowed to keep their existing Student visa for the duration of the work placement(s).

The University must continue to monitor attendance and engagement during the work placement, where poor attendance is reported, the academic department will investigate this and, where appropriate, action will be taken.

The student would need a new CAS to return to their studies.

### Working during your studies

If your visa conditions state you are allowed to work full-time during vacation time and on completion of your course then you need to check your terms (often found on [www.liverpool.ac.uk/terms-conditions/](http://www.liverpool.ac.uk/terms-conditions/)). They are different depending on the level of programme you are on.

**Undergraduate:** Vacation includes the winter, spring and summer University breaks.

**Postgraduate taught:** Vacation includes the winter and spring University breaks. You are still allowed to full-time during the summer until the end date of your course.

**Postgraduate Research:** There are no set vacation times. Any vacation periods should be approved by your supervisor. You are still allowed to full-time during the summer until the end date of your course.

There are also restrictions on what type of work you can do, you should therefore what these are. For example, you may not:

- Open up a business of your own
- Work on a self-employed basis (this includes business based outside the UK or online businesses)
- Act as an employer in any way
- Work as a professional sports person
- Sign a permanent contract of employment

### Intercalating students

Student visa holders are allowed to keep their existing visa whilst intercalating at another University on certain programmes.

During this time, the new institution will be responsible for ensuring Student compliance. Students will be required to provide evidence of enrolment to Student Administration.

Student visa holders returning to the University will be required for re-enrolling your year permitted to do so whilst holding a Student visa from a different institution. These students must provide evidence to Student Administration that their Student visa sponsor has notified them of the change of institution.

### University reporting duties for student visa holders

We are required to report to UKVI any changes to your registration. Changes that will cancel your student visa:

- You fail to register or re-register
- You complete your studies earlier than the end date on your CAS
- You withdraw from your studies for any reason
- You withdraw or research is terminated for any reason
- You are deemed withdrawn from your studies or research for any reason
- You transfer or re-register from your studies for any reason
- If you need to interrupt or suspend to take a work placement that is not an integral part of your programme
- You are suspended from your studies for any reason
- You are reporting studies with no attendance (Attendance Reporting)
- You are reporting studies with attendance in one semester only (Part-time Reporting)

Changes that will be reported to UKVI but will not cancel your visa:

- Transfer into another programme of study or research provided you can complete the new programme before the new subject is added to the old subject.
- Some courses will require you to transfer or re-new visas before you can transfer, you should speak to us for that point.
- Change of study location (e.g. a work placement, study abroad or research off-campus).

We will not report the following non-attendance list of events to UKVI:

- Any authorised short-term absence from study or research
- Any isolated instance or limited requirement of absence from timetabled activity

All circumstances listed above, which will be reported to UKVI, will be reported as a withdrawal of sponsorship to UKVI. This means your current visa will be cancelled and you will need to leave the UK. To return to your studies or research in the future you will need to re-apply for a new Student visa from the UK.

### Graduate Route Visa

The Graduate route visa is an emerging route designed to give Student visa holders who have been awarded an eligible qualification or additional 18 months or 24-month visa in which to look for and engage in employment, become self-employed or potentially start a business in the UK. Those who are awarded a PhD will be granted 3 years under the Graduate route, for all other eligible qualifications 18 months will be granted.

The Graduate route visa is independent from the University. A graduate from the University is responsible for ensuring they meet the requirements of the visa and applying for the visa when eligible. If they wish to:

- Students can only apply for this visa after being successfully awarded an eligible qualification and after receiving confirmation from the University that a report has been made to the UKVI confirming the award.

## Your attendance (expected interactions)

The University is required to keep records of your attendance and absence. We are also required to monitor your attendance and engagement with your studies to ensure you are engaging with and progressing on your course.

The following are interactions that may be considered for attendance and engagement monitoring, not just academic, for students on **taught** programmes of study.

Interaction	Timescale
Initial registration	September/October or January
Re-registration	Annually, September/October
Payment of fees	Throughout each year
Attendance at lectures, seminars, laboratory sessions, tutorials, field work etc.	Throughout each year (some programmes will have higher attendance requirements than others)
Attendance at work or clinical placements	Throughout each year (programme specific)
Submission of continuously assessed work (coursework etc.)	Throughout each year
Attendance at assessments (in class tests etc.)	Throughout each year
Attendance at examinations	Annually, normally January, May, August (where applicable)
Consideration of academic progress	Annually, February, June, September

The following are interactions that may be considered for attendance and engagement monitoring, not just academic, for students on **research** programmes:

Interaction	Timescale
Initial registration	October (can also take place at the beginning of other months of the year)
Payment of fees	Throughout each year
Attendance at meetings with supervisor (as recorded in PGR Toolbox online facility)	Monthly (at least one per month is required)
Attendance at seminars, laboratory sessions or workshops, including attendance at skills workshops and poster day events	Throughout each year (research programme specific)
Annual Progress Review	Annually, May-October

## SURCHARGE (IHS)

The Immigration Healthcare Surcharge (IHS) gives access to the National Health Service NHS):

- Can register with a General Practitioner (GP)
- Can then be seen by a Dr for free
- Prescriptions are then subsidised (£9.90 per item)
- Can be referred to a hospital for ongoing treatment for free under the NHS

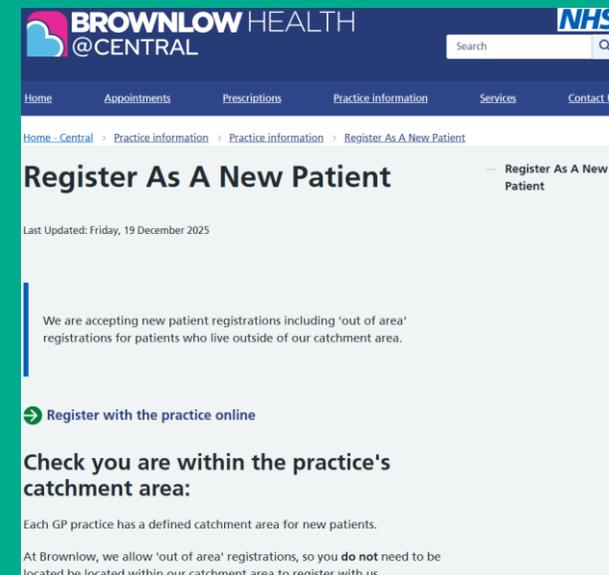
Nearest hospital (emergency or serious injury only):

- Liverpool Royal University Hospital (aka 'The Royal')
- Call 999 only if you cannot travel there yourself

Fraud is described within the Fraud Act 2006 as  
any

**dishonest**

**false representation**

**failure to declare** information  
or **abuse of position**

which is **intended**

to **make gain** (personally or for another)

**cause loss** or expose another to the risk of loss



**PROTECT:**

## S2. Fraud by false representation

This is perpetrated when false or misleading information is deliberately provided, either in writing and/or verbally.

This can also include failing to correct a false impression.

## S4. Fraud by abuse of position

Exploiting a position in which you are expected to protect, or not to act against, the **financial interests** of another person.

It can also be failing to take action rather than being the perpetrator of an act.

## S3. Fraud by failure to disclose information

Deliberately not providing information one is duty bound to disclose.

**Other fraud offences set out within the Fraud Act 2006 include:**

S6. Possessing articles for use or in connection with any fraud.

S7. Making, adapting, supplying, or offering to supply articles for use or in connection with any fraud.
