It is a small group of Veterinary Students who help local animal charities in the work they do. So please join to help to get involved with the charities, volunteer to help homeless pets and make a difference to the community!

Currently we support Care for the Paw which is a registered Charity in Liverpool and the Wirral who help to support dogs living on the streets or in hostels with their homeless owners. This is a great opportunity for Vet students to get involved and give back to the community, learn from vets and help improve the lives of pets on the street. This is a very rewarding team to get involved with.

Wednesdays- Hostel Visits- Years 3, 4, 5

Wednesdays involve visiting hostels with trained vets providing veterinary care to dogs including vaccinations, worming and flea treatments, post-op checks as well as other treatment and medications the dog may need.

Volunteering at the Clinic 10.30am-12.30pm Wednesdays - Hostel Visits After the Clinic (Transport Available)

1st and 3rd Saturdays of the Month - Outreach- Any year

This involves going out on the streets and interacting with homeless people and their pets, providing food, water, bowls, collars, leads, bedding, toys and dog treats to owners.

This also involves going out with a vet, and if the dog is unwell

potentially providing treatment.
