

Summary of General Practice Placements 2025-26

This document details sets out the activities, timings and e-Portfolio requirements for student doctors on General Practice placement per year group. It also provides information on remuneration, induction and the resources available to support you in your role.

Year 3 - Assessing Patients in General Practice		
Overview	Developing the skills of history-taking and examination to assess patients. The focus of the 3rd year placement is on patient contact and supervised clinical experience.

Year 4 - Diagnosing & Managing Patients in Primary Care		
Overview	The focus of the 4th year placement is on patient contact and supervised clinical experience to further develop their clinical reasoning, integrating differential diagnosis into their assessment process, with a view to producing management plans for patients.

Year 5 - The GP Student Assistant	
Overview	Complex decision-making in primary care. This placement is part of the Year 5 Acute Block and builds on previously acquired skills to develop an appreciation of the complexity of managing patients in primary care. This should include a focus on medical uncertainty, medically unexplained symptoms, management of acute illness and admission, the patient's journey through healthcare. Student doctors should be involved in aspects of acute care of patients, assisting clinicians during their consultations. Student doctors also have more self-directed time, with indirect supervision, to complete their Mandatory Experiences.

If your practice has a spare consultation room available for students to use when they are leading on consultation, please consider hosting senior medical students (year 4 and 5) as they benefit more from this activity.

Access to a spare consultation room is not a mandatory requirement to place students and many practices use alternative methods, such as hot-seat consulting, to meet this requirement.



Remuneration

Remuneration is the same across all years:

- £85 per student per session. All placements (Years 3, 4 and 5) are 7 sessions per week for 4 weeks.
- £4,760 per student pair per 4-week placement (£2380 per single student).

Additional Information

- All students require a Practice Induction on the first day of their placement. For more information, please visit the <u>Primary Care section</u> (link) of our Liverpool Educators Online (LEO) web area.
- All students have been DRB checked and seen by the University Occupational Health Department prior to attending clinical placements.
- All tutors are required to attend an online GP Tutor Update annually. This is held remotely on Teams and lasts 90 minutes. The event is run on three dates to provide flexibility for attendance.
